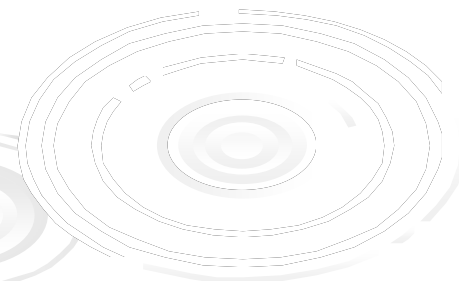
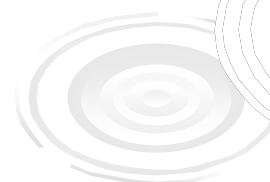


A Global Challenge with a Community Solution



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- Based on work conducted in communities on most continents since Lidköping (Sweden) became a pilot site in 1989.
- By the end of June 2008 – over 140 global demonstrations sites established utilising this intervention model.
- 200+ under preparation.







Terminology

- Safety Promotion is an organized process that has safety as an end goal.
- Injury Prevention has as an end goal, the prevention of injuries.
- Safety promotion, then, is a holistic approach to community wellbeing.
- It takes a broad view of prevention, and promotes multiple partnerships to meet goals.





The basics

- The overall aim in safety promotion is to cooperate, in a systematic and ongoing way, to address quality of life.
- SPIP – (Safety Promotion and Injury Prevention) oriented organisations also make a clear distinction between intentional and unintentional injuries.

Basics 1

- Intentional injuries include homicide, suicide and self harm. Such activities are intentional, or deliberately directed toward a person or group.
- The SC model encourages its members to address both kinds of injuries, but notes that prevention approaches for the two types of injuries do not always over-lap.





Basics 2

- At its heart, the Safe Communities model uses local expertise to address local factors that impact on the community's quality of life.
- Safe Communities organisations address SPIP activities aimed at community sectors, including workplaces and schools, traffic, home and leisure sectors.







Basics 3

- SC organisations may address causes of injuries, including violence, and natural disasters.
- SC organisations also address risk factors for both males and females, and for various age groups, in particular, for children and elders.
- Vulnerable groups are a particular focus of action.

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Criteria

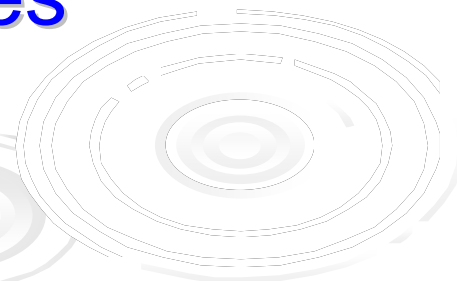
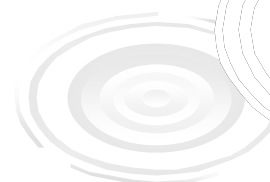
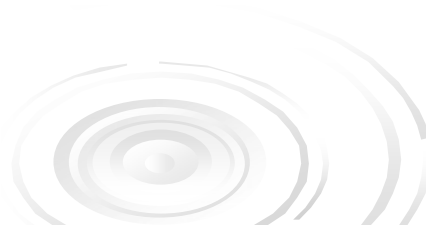
1. Collaborative leadership and coordination between major stakeholders
2. Long term, sustainable programs covering both genders, age groups, environments and situations
3. Programs that target high-risk groups and environments, and programs that promote safety for vulnerable groups





Criteria

4. Programs that document the frequency and causes of injuries
5. Evaluation measures to assess their programs, processes and the effects of change
6. Ongoing participation in national and international Safe Communities networks.

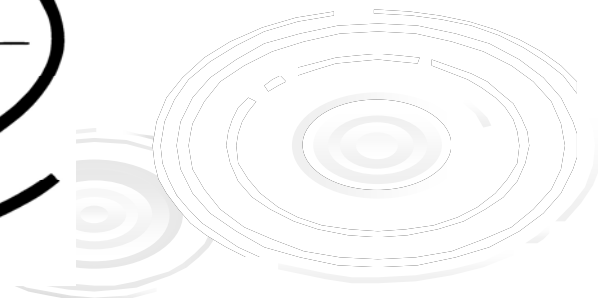
